Our History

In 1994, the Montana Community Service Act created the Commission on Community Service and the Governor's Office of Community Service (GOCS).

Since 2010 the Governor's Office of Community Service has served as the state's lead on educating, increasing awareness, and recognizing Montanans who, in loss of life, gave others the Gift of Life through organ, eye, and tissue donation.

Each April is National Donate Life Month. Donate Life Month raises awareness about donation, encourages Americans to register as organ, eye, and tissue donors, and honors those who have saved lives.

Honoring Donors

To honor individuals and families whose loved one gave the ultimate gift, the Governor's Office of Community Service has two metal tree sculptures by Montana artist Jim Dolan.

Each leaf bears the name of a Montanan who gave the gift of life. Both trees are on public display - one on the first floor of the Capitol, and the other in the Department of Justice's

Montanans of all walks of life will continue to lose loved ones each year, many by tragedy and unexpected events. This presents the need to create a sustainable, and place-based outdoor memorial to Montanans and their families and to serve as a symbol of hope to those who are waiting.

Statistics

86% of Montanans are registered organ donors, significantly higher than the national percentage of 56%

More than 1,626 Montanans, living and deceased, have given eye, tissue, or organ donation since 1988 including 14 in 2024

In 2024, 60 from Montanans gave 164 life-saving organ transplants.

There are more than 100,000 Americans waiting for a life-saving organ transplant, and on any given day, 178 of those individuals are Montanans

Progress so Far

The design and location on the Capitol grounds are approved for such a memorial near an existing walking path that is accessible to people of all ages and abilities.

While the legislature has approved the design and location, there are no public funds to build it.

Over \$15,000 has been secured and invested in the design, including a land survey donated to advance the effort.
